From the President

Now that the holidays have all passed and we are back to the old grind, we have again broadened our scope to include issues outside of family. But, since many of you were concentrating on family, you may not have been reading your Rotarian magazine as completely as you normally do. (I know Ed Yarrish reads it completely because it doubles for his Sears catalog.) In the January issue there was an article on the 2006 Nobel Prize winner, Mohammed Yunus. (The award announcement was made in October and in keeping with being on top of all economic issues, Al Bova quickly sent me an email.)

***Dr. Yunus' simple idea
 of microcredits
 has revolutionized
 humanitarian assistance.***

Mohammed Yunus is a Bangladeshi economist who pioneered the idea of micro-loans. He received the Nobel Prize for Economics, and the Rotary Award for World Understanding and Peace, for developing this concept.

The concept is simple. Provide small loans for individuals to start businesses. Loans are typically \$100 or so in LDCs, so that a woman might be able to buy a used sewing machine to set up a sewing business, or funds to a man to buy tools to become a carpenter (Competition, Alan!). Banks typically do not make these loans because the loans are too small and the individuals are not bankable – no credit history or collateral. (Karolyn, no comments regarding my credit worthiness asking for lunch money!)

Rotary International Scholarships and Teaching Grants



For this Rotary year, District 7430 will be sponsoring the following scholarships:

- (1) 2008-10 Rotary World Peace Fellowships
- (2) 2008-9 Rotary Grants for University Teachers.
- (3) The Rotary Peace and Conflict Program.

Every district, except for multi-county districts, can submit one candidate for the 2008-10 Rotary World Peace Fellowships competition.

Each district may submit as many candidates for each session of the Rotary Peace and Conflict Studies Program as they deem qualified, regardless of district funds available to sponsor candidates.

Each district can submit one candidate for The University Teacher Grant for the 2008-2009 Rotary year.

Information all these programs can be found on the RI.org website under educational programs. The deadline to get applications into the district: Rotary Peace Fellowship, May 18, 2007; University Teacher, September 17, 2007; Peace and Conflict Studies, May 18, 2007 and November 23, 2007.

The Gift of Music

December 15 – “And a good time was had by all.” A well-worn cliché, but it fit the occasion of our annual holiday music performance. The program showcased the expertise of the Community Music School (CMS), its faculty and student. Under the experienced, steady hand of our member, George Schermerhorn, its former director for 17 years, we were introduced to Dennis Duda, CMS new Executive Director, Carolyn Clarke, Director of Development and Marketing and the President of its Board, “Rusty” Sullivan (sounds familiar – he gets around and does the right things!).

But the true focus was on the performers. The opening number featured one of CMS’s newer students, 12 year old Gregory Gennara, who played Accolay’s Concerto No. 1 on his violin accompanied by Dr. David Saturen. Young Gregory not only showed how well he mastered this difficult musical instrument after taking lessons for only four years, but he played the entire piece without resorting to any written music! Watching this well-rounded

student gives one renewed faith in the new generation of our country: multi-talented, motivated and involved.

But then it was time for a genre of Holiday Music presented by a faculty member and a local music teacher, Dr. David Saturen and Dr. Nora Suggs, respectively. While their resumes are impressive as teachers, composers, arrangers, etc. they also showed that they are true musicians in their own right.

This program gave us another reason to reflect upon some of our less publicized and recognized Lehigh Valley treasures - the Community Music School. Celebrating their 25 years in “Harmony with our community” CMS is a non-profit musical education organization which continues to reach nearly a thousand members through instruction in nearly every instrument and voice. Cultural organizations have a tough time competing with other private and public interests but are needed if we want to perpetuate our way of life which makes the Lehigh Valley a great place to live, not only in the holiday season, but throughout the year.

Michael Milkin, junk bond king, made a fortune when found out that the default rate on even B-grade bonds was low. The same is true with these micro loans. The repayment rates are 98%. (Forget it, Andre,

Larry, Dave, there’s no money in it. You can’t get the same gouging fee structure you’re accustomed to.) “Dr. Yunus’s simple idea of microcredits has revolutionized humanitarian assistance efforts,” said past RI President James Lacey.

This Rotarian’s microloan concept has grown greatly. Your Paul Harris funds have helped foster Rotary-sponsored village banks in 12 countries. This is the kind of program that not only demonstrates Rotary’s “Service above Self,” but enables a new “self” to become a contributor and a provider of service.

Paul Harris, Richard Iobst Fellows By the Numbers

December 1 – Past President Kathy Frazier explained the requirements to become Paul Harris Fellows and Richard Iobst Fellows, which is \$1,000 donations to either Rotary International Foundation and/or \$1,000 to our Allentown Rotary Foundation.

The Richard Iobst Foundation's mission is to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education and the alleviation of poverty. The Iobst Foundation began in 1917.

Educational programs include Ambassadorial Scholarships, Group Study Exchange and grants provided to university teachers to work in developing countries.

Humanitarian programs are funded through R.I. for projects to improve the quality of life, to provide health care, clean water, food, education and essential needs, primarily in the developing world.

Our club Foundation was created in 1969 to contribute to the betterment of the Allentown area, including donating monies to qualified charitable and social welfare organizations. It also provides annual scholarships to local students.

Kathy recognized both the Harris and Iobst Fellows and gave special recognition to Allentown Rotarians who are Fellows of both foundations. These contributors are Ibi

Balog, Barbara Bigelow, Wendy Body, Bob Brown, Wallace Eldridge, Orville Hawk, Grayson McNair, Rolf Schlake, Bill Siegele, Pete Smith, Bob Stevens and Art Weinrach.

Community Service Grants

Amy Meleck reported for the Community Service Committee. The dictionary project was a huge success resulting in 1,300 dictionaries delivered to 13 Allentown schools to 3rd graders. She recognized the Rotarians who volunteered to interact with the students, and a special thanks to Michele Varricchio for labeling and delivering the dictionaries. She also thanked the donors who raised \$1,000 toward the project.

Next on the agenda was the presentation of the Allentown Rotary Foundation's Community Service Grant. Amy noted that it was a very tough decision for her committee to select one organization out of 42 applications to receive one award of \$10,000.

The \$10,000 check was awarded to St. Luke's Hospital, Allentown Campus, to fund a vision program partnering with Raub Middle School in their neighborhood. It has been determined that a large number of Raub students need glasses in order to be able to succeed in school.

The grant was presented to St. Luke's board member Bob Black, who is a member of

Allentown Rotary. He graciously accepted the grant because of his belief that St. Luke's is a premier hospital of caring in the Lehigh Valley.
