Dec. 7 – The Community Service Committee announced the following grants:

Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired - \$2,000



Project: ABVI Aids and Devices Store Furnishings - The store will allow consumers to purchase devices that will help them to retain their independence and open the door of independence to others. Merchandise includes watches, clocks and tablets for the visually impaired.

Boys and Girls Club of Allentown - \$2,000

Project: Back Pack Buddies - This provides 3600 weekend meals for 10 at-risk children residing in the Allentown area during the 2008 year. The Boys and Girls Club works with Second Harvest Food Bank to provide a total of 76 children with meals.

Communities in Schools of the Lehigh Valley, Inc. - \$2,000
Project: 2008 Promotion and Graduation Ceremonies.

The grants will fund the ceremony to celebrate high school graduation of students who have a high risk of dropping out of school. Students and community partners are honored for





Lehigh County Conference of Churches - \$1,500 - Project: Pathways
This program provides counseling and housing case management
services to men, women and families with children in Allentown who
are homeless or threatened with homelessness. The grant will assist
families who have had their utilities cut off.

Jewish Family Service of the Lehigh Valley - \$1,500 - Project: Kosher Food Pantry

This is an emergency pantry providing non-perishable food and personal care items to people in need. The fund is used to purchase gift certificates that pantry clients can redeem at local stores for fresh produce, dairy and meats that the pantry cannot stock.



Physician Assistant Program at DeSales University - \$1,000 - Project: DeSales University Physician



Assistant Free Clinic at Allentown Rescue Mission Since January, this program has provided free medical care to 177 individuals. DeSales students staff the clinic and faculty have oversight. The grant will be used to purchase medical equipment.

Homegrown in The Lehigh Valley: Ciclon

Oct. 26 – High on the Lehigh University mountaintop campus sits a local valley secret that could power the world, literally. A Ben Franklin Technology Partners awardee, Ciclon Semiconductor Device Corporation makes transistors. "If it plugs into an outlet or runs on a battery, Power MOSFET's deliver power to electronic systems."

Marc Granahan, President and CEO, is a 24 year veteran in the semiconductor industry. He founded Ciclon when he acquired the RF Power Product Line from Agere Systems in March of 2005.

The growth and desire for information and music is pushing this industry to capacity. The number of transistors doubles every 24 months. Ciclon's "secret sauce" is making transistors energy efficient and cost efficient.

Potential impact on the world? Saving eight billion watts of energy; eliminating 13 power stations globally,

and consuming CO2

equivalent to a forest in PA.

Customers include many government companies, Huges, and Nortel. Expected growth by 2010 is \$168 million and Ciclon plans on going public in 2009. We can be proud of this locally grown product!

November 9 – Our Veteran's Day meeting began with the invocation by Dave Bausch, remembering those who served our country in the past and those currently serving in many parts of this world.

Tom Dye is director of Veterans Affairs in Lehigh County. An Air Force veteran, Dye served in the military police for ten years, then moved on to personnel to help obtain veteran benefits. In his current position, he is able to represent any veteran in accessing benefits, including in the appeals process.

In the last three years, over 53 million dollars in new benefits have been brought into Pennsylvania. This is the fifth largest amount in the nation. Lehigh is one of nine counties that brought in over one million in new benefits.

If a veteran would happen to lose his or her job, benefits are available immediately for three months. Service connected injuries are also handled by Dye, much of what can be done is based on income and space availability in the VA clinic. The more severe health care needs are handled at the Veterans Hospital in Wilkes Barre.

Dye's biggest problem, given his lack of staff, is outreach. Too many are simply not aware of benefits available and how to access them.

In answer to a question from the floor, he noted that the only facility dealing with homeless veterans in our area is Victory House in Bethlehem. To be placed, the individual must go through a VA clinic.

All in all, a most informative talk and appropriate for this Veteran's Day program.

Three Speakers: "One Faith, Two Worlds"

November 16 – In summer 2006, Morning Call photographer, Harry Fisher, and author, Veronica Torrejn, accompanied eight missionaries from Bethlehem's Central Moravian Church to document their visit to Tanzania, Africa. Harry Fisher filmed and produced a video which he shared with Rotarians. A six-part series by Veronica Torrejn was published in The Morning Call in summer 2007.

The Rev. Gordon Mowrer and his wife, Mary Mowrer, led the other mission participants as they went to Tanzanian villages to meet with orphans whose parents died of AIDS. Many are recipients of relief provided by the Central Moravian Church, Bethlehem.

Highlighted in the video is the work of Tanzanian, Mama Zimpora Kimwaga, who provides much needed care for the orphans in her village. The missionaries developed close ties with the Tanzanian Moravian congre-

gation and sponsored a trip for Mama Kimwaga to Bethlehem so that she could speak to the Central Moravian Church congregation about her work and the needs of her congregation.

According to Mowrer, the Central Moravian Church congregation is now providing aid to build a dining room and kitchen for the Tanzanian Moravians.

Following presentation of the video, Moravian missionary and Rev.
Mowrer's daughter, Ruth Huron, told Allentown Rotarians that she took her depressed 13 year-old son, Forrest, to Tanzania, Africa, to show him a world that she also needed to see, "a world where my son does not need special gadgets to see a special world inside him.

"I was inspired by Mama Kimwaga and the beautiful people in Tanzania to do something, to care, to make a difference, and to put priorities in a different direction," stated Ruth as she struggled to describe her lifealtering experience.

Citizens Vote for Change

November 2 – Grayson McNair gave Allentown Rotarians a rousing civics lesson. He explained the core issues that triggered the proposal to change Lower Macungie Town-ship from a Second Class Township to a First Class Township. These issues include:

- Over \$2.5 million embezzled over seven years.
- The Second Class form of government is outdated, because it does not provide for checks and balances.
- Second Class Township government has inherent conflict of interest built into its structure.
- Fiscal affairs can be kept secret. Lower Macungie Township has a \$10 million surplus that was not publicly disclosed until recently.

• Second Class Townships are designed for rural communities. Massive growth has occurred in Lower Macungie Township, which is now larger than the city of Easton.

Grayson emphasized the main purpose for establishing a First Class Township is to restore public trust. He explained that the relevant laws were written in the 1890's and are antiquated. However, "we must work within the existing laws and establish the most appropriate form of government for our current situation."

There are several advantages to Lower Macungie being a First Class Township, including greater transparency, improved checks and balances, prohibition of supervisors from being employees, and the election of five commissioners to four year terms.

On election day, the

voters of Lower Macungie Township voted "yes" to adopting a First Class form of government.

Congratulations to Grayson and the Lower Macungie Township Citizen for Change on their successful efforts!


